1. Course Synopsis

This course is an introduction to language development, with a primary focus on Chinese children. Topics include early speech and phonological development, word learning and semantic growth, the emergence of grammar and the development of discourse skills. Major theoretical models in the field are introduced to frame the discussions of contributing factors, such as innate predispositions, parental inputs and social interactions. Students' understanding of the developmental process will be consolidated by conducting child language sample analyses.
