## Nationalism in China and the Challenge to Democracy

This seminar focuses on the rising populist nationalism in China and how it complicates the democratic pursuit. Decades of rapid economic growth have earned China a quasi-superpower status, bringing unprecedented pride and self-confidence to Chinese people and a sense of justification for its authoritarian rule. Economically boosted nationalism is also linked to, and easily fuels, a deep-rooted Sino-centrism that is both anti-West and anti-minority among some sectors of the Han Chinese public.

## **Prof YU Tianlong (Visiting Professor)**

Dr. Yu is Professor of Education at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville. A former educational researcher in China, he has taught in the U.S. for the past 20 years. A recipient of the American Educational Studies Association (AESA) Critics Choice Book Award, Dr. Yu is an accomplished scholar in moral education, citizenship education, and multicultural education. He was Treasurer-Secretary of AERA SIG Confucianism, Taoism and Education (2008-2011) and a member of the Executive Board of the Association for Moral Education (2014-2017). He currently sits on the editorial board for the Routledge Series on Life and Values Education and is Program Chair for AERA SIG Democratic Citizenship in Education (2019-2020).
