


A Child Perspective or a Child's Perspective - What's the different?



My results show that:

- Teachers have different views about their participation in children's learning (Mårdsjö 2005).
- The difference and the meaning have consequences for children's learning.





Theacher understand their participation in children's learning in two gualitively different ways:


A child perspective

 The teacher being sensitive to the children and the world around them.

A child's perspective

 The teacher being sensitive to the children and the world around them and challening the children in their learning.





These two qualitatively different conseptions




· are hierarchically ordered

 There is a complexity between thes two perspective in learning situation.



The teacher's ability

 to being sensitive to children and the world is precondition for her to become able to challange children's ability (Pramling Samulsson & Mårdsjö Olsson, 2007)



The aim of my presentation

- is to account the child- and the child's perspectives
- develop what it means to the child's ability to create a meningful and purposeful learning if we take one perespective or the other.



The Theoretical points

 Variations theory focuses primearily om teachers' teaching and theaching practices.


 It is also a theory of learning with consequenses for teaching.



The diffrence between ...

 A theacher who take a child perspective is child-centred.

 A teacher who take a child's perspective is relational.





Characteristic for a child perspective:

- Teachers who experience that they participate in children's learning by beeing sensitive to childrens
- Interests
- Engagements
- Questions
- · Comments




The figur for a teacher who take a child perspective

 Her professional way of finding out how children think about and understand a specific content, and to act out from a general theretical frame for how children learn.



Characteristic for a child's perspective:

 The teacher's saying that they challenge the children in their learning based on what they know and understand about how children think and reson.



The figur for a teacher who take a child's Perspective

 Her awereness of how she in her professional actions can use children's thoughts in order to help them develop further knowledge and abilities.



Concluding

 The strategy of taking a child perspective is fundamental in all education, but if this strategy is not developed in such a way that the teacher takes a child's perspective in her teaching, the theacher's knowledge about children's learning becomes abstract, wich has consequenses for the education.
